35th Infantry Division - 137th Infantry Regiment - E Company



Howard Donald Keplinger was born November 4, 1919, in Hagerstown, Washington County, Maryland. His father is Howard C. Keplinger (1887- 1956) and his mother Lona E. Widdows (1885- 1963). He had five brothers and two sisters.

Howard married Evelyn Virginia Summers in 1939. They had three daughters: Betty Jean (Price), Betsy Jane (Thompson) and Peggy (Dudley). Betty Jean and Betsy Jane are twins. Two of the daughters live in Hagerstown, Maryland, and one daughter lives in Harrisonville Pennsylvania.

Keplinger enlisted in the Army on March 14, 1944, at Fort George G. Meade, Maryland. PFC Keplinger received his basic training at camp Wheeler, Georgia. He joined Company E of the 137th Infantry Regiment on September 18, 1944. He was promoted to PFC on November 30, 1944.

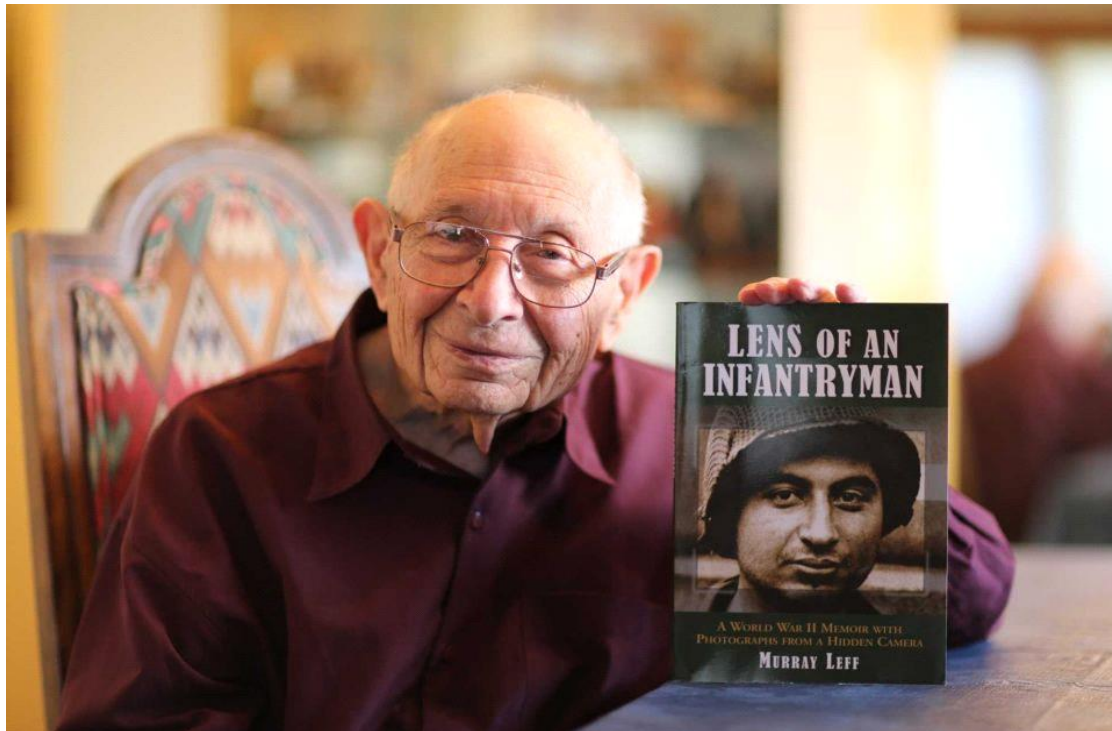


Regimental crest of the 137th Infantry Regiment, 35th Infantry Division. PFC

On October 1, 1944, I arrived at Gremercy Forest in France as a replacement. It was late in the afternoon and soon would be dark. I was told to dig a foxhole because we would be getting in on enemy artillery that night. As I started digging, Howard, who I had never seen before, joined me in furiously digging my foxhole. Sure enough, the next morning I saw how the trees around us were all shattered from the previous night's bombardment. Howard was that kind of guy . . . always helping when he could.

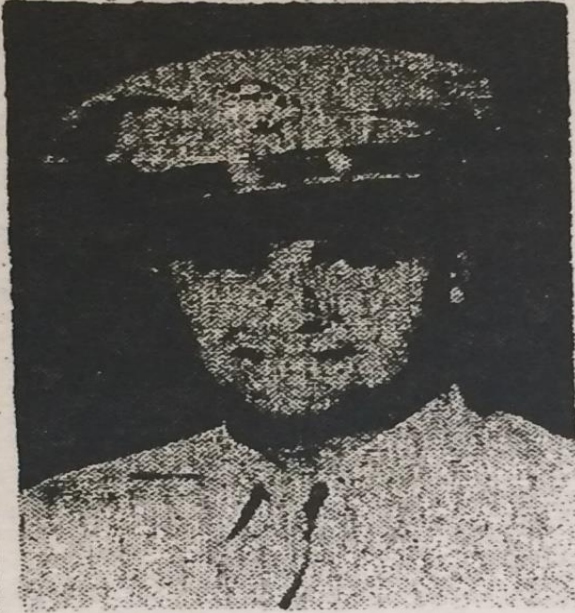
PFC Howard Keplinger was Killed in Action March 9, 1945. The 35th Division was in Germany. On March 7th, the Division was fighting on the outskirts of Ossenbergl while absorbing all types of intense enemy fire. The road from Rheinberg to Ossenbergl gave the 137th the strongest opposition encountered during this operation and was dubbed "88 Alley". The enemy was determined to hold Ossenbergl in order to keep their positions west of the Rhine River and Wesel. On March 9th, the 2nd Battalion was mopping up the remaining enemy resistance in Ossemlbergl. PFC Keplinger was killed in action that day. He is buried in the American Cemetery and Memorial at Margraten, Limburg, Netherlands, Plot H., Row 6, Grave 27

Local Soldier, Father of Three Children, Dies in Battle

Pfc. Howard Donald Keplinger, 25, 224 South Mulberry street, was killed March 9 in Germany, his wife, Mrs. Evelyn Keplinger, was advised yesterday by the War Department.

A member of the 137th Infantry Company of the 35th Division in



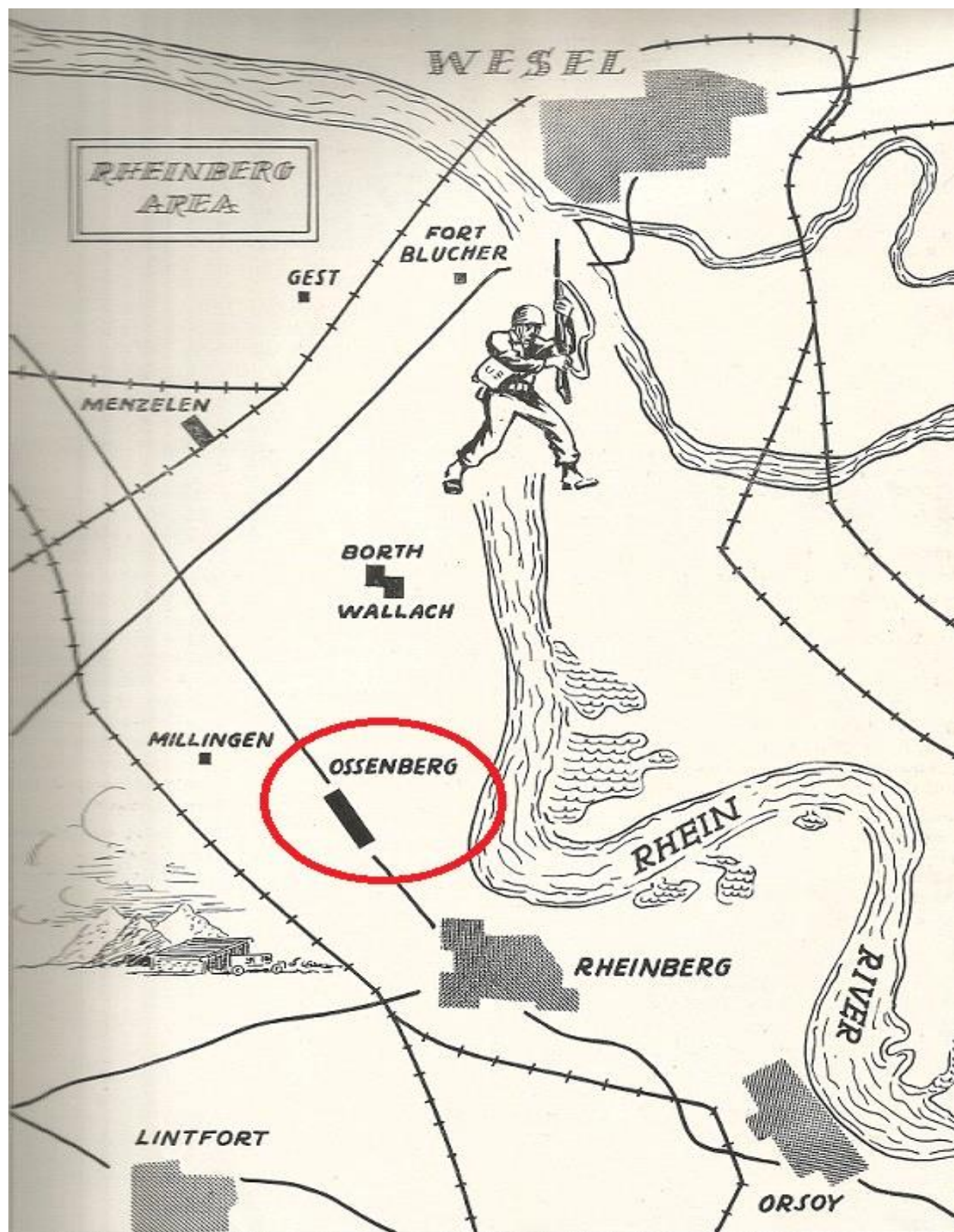

the Third Army, Pfc. Keplinger was employed at the M. P. Moller Company as a Fairchild Aircraft inspector before he entered the service March 15, 1944.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard C. Keplinger, 118 West Wilson boulevard, he received his basic training at Camp Wheeler, Ga., and had been overseas eight months. In addition to Germany, he served in France, Belgium and Holland.

Besides his parents and wife he is survived by three children, Jean, Jane and Joan; five brothers and two sisters.

PFC Howard Keplinger is the recipient of the Purple Heart and the Silver Star:

The President of the United States of America, authorized by Act of Congress July 9, 1918, takes pride in presenting the Silver Star (Posthumously) to PrivateFirst Class Howard D. Keplinger (ASN: 33845493) United States Army, for gallantry in action while serving with the 137th Infantry Regiment, 35th Infantry Division in action near Ossenbergh, Germany, on 9 March 1945. Although himself wounded by shell fragments during the course of a sharp enemy counterattack supported by artillery fire and tanks, Private Keplinger, a rifleman, made his way to a wounded comrade some fifty yards distant. As he carried the soldier to cover, Private Keplinger was killed by the near burst of another enemy artillery shell. His gallant self-sacrifice in placing the life of a wounded comrade above any thought of personal safety reflects the highest credit upon Private Keplinger's character as a soldier.


Howard's brother, Sgt. Rudolph L. Keplinger served in the Pacific Theater during World War II and died of his wounds on May 24, 1945, on Luzon. Rudolph served as a Sergeant, 12th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division, U.S. Army. He enlisted in the Army on December 16, 1942, in Baltimore, Maryland. He was noted as being employed as a sheet metal worker. He was married to Delorous Marker. Three days after his brother's death, he himself went to the aid of a wounded friend and was wounded.

Rudolph "Died Of Wounds" received in action on May 24, 1945, and was awarded the Purple Heart. He is buried in the Manila American Cemetery in the Philippines in Plot B, Row 4, Grave 138. He was also awarded the Silver Star.

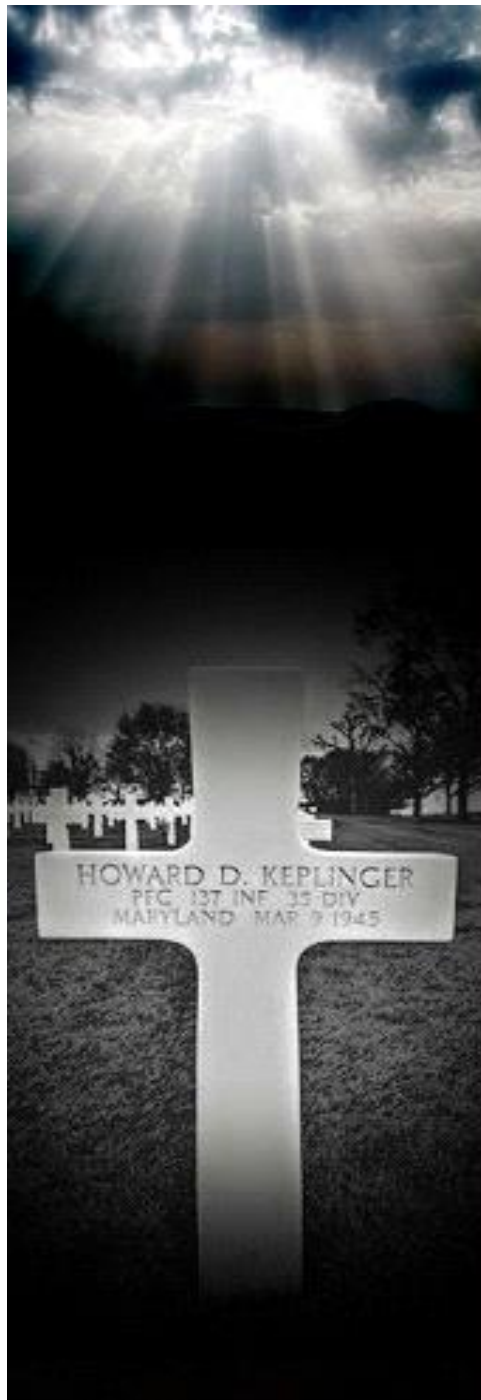

Posthumous Medals Given To Brothers

Howard and Rudolph Keplinger Cited for Heroism

Two Hagerstown brothers, serving in the Army at opposite sides of the world, have been awarded the Silver Star posthumously for gallantry in action displayed when they exposed themselves to enemy fire to rescue wounded comrades.
