SUBJECT: Report After Action Against Enemy.

TO : The Adjutant General, Washington 25, D. C.

1. In compliance with the provisions of Par 10, C3, AR 345-105, submitted below is report after action against enemy for the 110th Medical Battalion covering the period 1-31 March 1945.

March 1, 1945.

Hq & Hq Det moved from Gangelt to Ratheim, Company A located at Wassenberg, Company B at Wildenrath, Company C closed at Ratheim and moved to Kaldenkirchen. Second Platoon Co D, closed at Gangelt and moved to Ratheim, 1st Platoon closed at Oberbruch and held in reserve. Forty casualties processed including two from other units not attached, two German Prisoners of War, one German civilian. Seven were lightly wounded and two were seriously wounded.

March 2, 1945.

Hq & Hq Det moved to Bracht, Company A to Venlo, Company B to Leuth, Company C to Venlo, First Platoon Co D, moved to Bracht. Second platoon at Ratheim. Sixty three casualties were handled including five from other units not attached, twelve German Prisoners of War, One Dutch civilian. Twenty-four were slightly and three seriously wounded.

March 3, 1945.

Hq & Hq Det moved to Nieuverk, Company A to Stadt-Straelen, Company B to Bockholt, Company C to Nieuverk. Second Platoon Co D, moved to Nieuverk, First Platoon remained at Bracht. Seventy-eight casualties were received including eight from other units not attached and fifteen German Prisoners of War. Twenty-eight were lightly and two seriously wounded.

March 4, 1945.

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Hq & Hq Det, Company A, Company C and Company D all located at Nieuverk, Company B moving from Bockholt to Nieuverk and then on to Rheurdt. One hundred and forty-two casualties were handled thru the station including twenty-three from other units not attached, fifteen German Prisoners of War and four German civilians. Thirty-eight were slightly wounded and ten seriously wounded.

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March 5, 1945.

Company B moved to Linfort and Company C to Sevelen, First Platoon Co D, moved to Nieukerk, all other units in same location. Ninty-six casualties were handled including fifteen from other units not attached, fourteen German Prisoners of War and ten German civilians. Twenty-nine were lightly and four were seriously wounded.

March 6, 1945.

First Platoon Company D moved to Lintfort, all other units remained in same locations. One hundred and thirteen casualties were processed including ten from other units, forty German Prisoners of War and nine civilians. Twenty were lightly and six seriously wounded.

March 7, 1945.

Hq and Hq Det moved to Linfort, Company A to Sevelen, Company B remained at Lintfort, Company C moved to Lintfort, Second Platoon joined 1st Platoon, Co D at Lintfort. Sixty-nine casualties handled including twelve from other units not attached, one German Prisoner of War and four civilians. Twenty-five were slightly and six seriously wounded.

March 8, 1945.

No change in location of units, Clearing Station handling one hundred and seventy-seven casualties including thirty-three from other units not attached, twenty-three Prisoners of War and four civilians. Seventy-three were lightly and thirteen seriously wounded.

March 9, 1945.

Company A moved to Hogenhof, all other units no changes in locations. Eighty casualties processed including fifteen from other units not attached, eleven German Prisoners of War and two civilians. Twenty-seven were lightly and five seriously wounded.

March 10, 1945.

All units remaining in same locations. Eighty-four casualties handled including seventeen from other units not attached, twenty-seven German Prisoners of War and eight civilians. Nine were lightly wounded.

March 11, 1945.

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March 11, 1945.

All units remained in same locations handling fifty casualties including seventeen from other units not attached, three German Prisoners of War and three civilians. Five were lightly and five were seriously wounded.

March 12, 1945.

Company A moved to Borholz, Company C to Bracht, and Second Platoon Company D to Bracht. Other units held same locations. Eleven casualties were handled including three from other units not attached and one Belgium civilian. One was seriously wounded.

March 13, 1945.

Headquarters and Hq Det, Company B and First Platoon Company D moved to Bracht. Company A still located at Borholz. Thirty-two casualties were handled including one German Prisoner of War. One was seriously wounded.

March 14, 1945.

No changes in location of units. Division out of contact with the enemy. Twenty-five casualties handled all from Division troops. One was lightly wounded.

March 15, 1945.

No changes in location of units. Thirty-five casualties processed including three from other units not attached. Two were lightly wounded.

March 16, 1945.

No changes in location, Division still in rest and checking of clothing and equipment being completed. Twenty-four casualties being handled including one civilian. One was lightly wounded.

March 17, 1945.

No changes in locations or missions of units this Battalion. Clearing Station processed thirty casualties including one from other units not attached. One was lightly wounded in action.

March 18, 1945.

No changes with thirty casualties going through Clearing Station including three from other units not attached. Two were lightly wounded.

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March 19, 1945.

All units except Company A located at Bracht, Company A at Borholz. Twenty-eight patients handled through Clearing Station. All from Division troops, no battle casualties.

March 20, 1945.

No change in unit locations. Twenty-eight casualties processed including one from other units not attached. One was lightly wounded.

March 21, 1945.

No change in locations of units, Division still held in reserve and resting. Forty-seven casualties handled including one from other units not attached and three civilians.

March 22, 1945.

No changes in unit locations. Twenty-six casualties processed including one from other units not attached. One was lightly wounded.

March 23, 1945.

No changes in locations of units. Twenty-six patients handled including two from other units not attached. One was lightly wounded.

March 24, 1945.

Same locations for all units. Thirty-two casualties handled thru the Clearing Station. All were from Division troops and there were no battle casualties.

March 25, 1945.

All units in same locations. Twenty-two casualties handled including three from other units not attached. One was lightly wounded.

March 26, 1945.

The Division starting to move back into position. Headquarters and Hq Det, Company C and D moved to Vorde, Company A located in Bergerhoff and Company B in Dinslaken. All units making the crossing of the Rhine River. Five casualties were handled.

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March 27, 1945.

All units maintained same locations except Company B. Company B moved to Litkampshop. One hundred casualties handled including one from other units not attached, ten German prisoners of war and fifteen civilians. Thirty-eight were lightly and four seriously wounded.

March 28, 1945.

Company A moved to Krevl, Company B to Walsumermark, Company C to Hiesfeld. Hq and Hq Det with Company D remaining in Vorde. Two hundred and fourteen casualties handled including fifteen from other units not attached, twenty-two German Prisoners of War and one civilian. One hundred and eleven were lightly and twenty-seven seriously wounded.

March 29, 1945.

Company A moved to Hagenhof, all other units remaining in former locations. One hundred and six casualties handled including one from other units not attached, seventeen German Prisoners of War and one civilian. Forty-six were lightly and eight seriously wounded.

March 30, 1945.

Hq and Hq Det and Company D moved to Grafen. Company C moved to Sterkrade. Company A remained in Hagenhof and Company B in Walsumermark. Ninety-one casualties handled including fifteen German Prisoners of War and four civilians. Thirty-two were lightly and seven seriously wounded.

March 31, 1945.

Hq and Hq Det and Company D moved to Rentfort. Company A to Buer, Company B to Buer-Krle, Company C remained in Sterkrade. Sixty-one casualties processed including nine from other units not attached, one German Prisoner of War and one civilian. Twenty-one were lightly and seven seriously wounded.
