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I -- SILVER STAR. Pursuant to authority contained in AR 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded, posthumously, to the following officer and enlisted man:

Second Lieutenant Walter A Bomberger, 0887634, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action at * * *, Belgium on 2 January 1945. When his platoon was about to cross open terrain in an attack upon strong enemy positions, it was subjected to an intense enemy mortar barrage augmented by small arms fire. Realizing that the success of the operation lay in pressing the attack, Lieutenant Bomberger shouted words of encouragement to his men, urging them to follow him as he began to cross the open ground under enemy fire. While directing and leading his men in the final assault upon the objective, Lieutenant Bomberger was killed by enemy fire. His outstanding leadership, courage and disregard for personal safety bespeak such gallantry in action as to be in accord with military tradition. Entered military service from Nebraska.

Sergeant Henry J Jurkiewicz, 36561518, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action near * * *, Germany on 23 February 1945. When he observed enemy troops attempting to outflank his unit which was advancing under cover of darkness, Sergeant Jurkiewicz, a machine gun section sergeant, ordered his men to set up their weapons, and rushed forward firing his rifle to draw enemy fire away from his section. He was killed by enemy fire after inflicting casualties upon the enemy. His gallant self-sacrifice enabled his men to get a machine gun in action and kill or rout the entire enemy force. Sergeant Jurkiewicz's heroic actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service. Entered military service from Michigan.

II -- SILVER STAR. Pursuant to authority contained in AR 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, a Silver Star is awarded to the following officer and enlisted man of this command:

Colonel Edward A Kimball, 010377, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action in the vicinity of * * * and * * *, Germany on 6 March 1945. On this day Colonel Kimball gallantly led his combat command in their first major encounter against the enemy. In order to insure efficient execution of his plans he was conspicuously present with his leading elements at the most critical times. Colonel Kimball exposed himself on many occasions to enemy fire of all types in order to personally set an example of personal bravery and leadership. His courage, tactical acumen, and gallantry in action are deserving of the highest praise and a credit to the United States Army. Entered military service from New Mexico.

Technician Fifth Grade Reuben G Lobley Jr, 33786160, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action near * * *, Germany on 23 February 1945. When his unit's advance was halted by an entrenched enemy machine gun protected by anti-personnel mines, Corporal Lobley, an acting communications chief, voluntarily moved forward through the mine field under enemy mortar and machine gun fire, laying a sound power line from the mortar section to an observation post about 25 yards from the enemy emplacement. Although slightly wounded, he retraced his steps, repaired three breaks in the wire, then assisted in directing mortar fire until the enemy emplacement was eliminated. By his gallant actions under fire, Corporal Lobley enabled his unit to resume its advance and capture the town of * * *, Germany, with minimum casualties. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

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III -- SILVER STAR (OAK-LEAF CLUSTER). Pursuant to authority contained in AR 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, in addition to the Silver Star previously awarded, a bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is awarded to the following enlisted man of this command:

Sergeant Bernard F Duffy, 42053117, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action near * * * , Germany on 23 February 1945. When his unit's attack was checked by enemy automatic weapons fire, Sergeant Duffy, an assistant squad leader, borrowed a bazooka, crawled forward, raised to his knees, fired four rounds and routed the enemy from entrenched positions. Later in the day, he braved enemy mortar fire to carry a fellow soldier suffering from shock to safety. His courage, initiative, disregard for personal safety and devotion to duty reflect high credit upon his character and training as a soldier. Entered military service from New York.

IV -- BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Pursuant to authority contained in AR 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded, posthumously, to the following enlisted man:

Private Jack D Tanner, 38286358, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near * * * , Germany on 23 February 1945. When his unit's attack was temporarily halted by enemy machine gun fire from an entrenched position on the right, Private Tanner, a rifleman, moved toward the emplacement drawing the enemy fire while other members of his squad flanked the position from the left. While so engaged, Private Tanner was killed by enemy fire. By his heroic self-sacrifice, he enabled his squad to neutralize the enemy position which was holding up the advance in this sector. Entered military service from Texas.

V -- BRONZE STAR MEDAL. Pursuant to authority contained in AR 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, a Bronze Star Medal is awarded to the following officers and enlisted men of this command:

Captain Arthur J Kraft, 01284718, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Germany from 11 July 1944 to 20 February 1945. Entered military service from Michigan.

First Lieutenant George M Chirigos, 0541720 (then second lieutenant), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near * * * , Belgium on 29 January 1945. Lieutenant Chirigos, a platoon leader, directed the leading assault platoon of Company I, * * * Infantry, in a successful attack on the town of * * * , personally placing himself at the head of his men as they moved across open terrain in the face of heavy enemy fire. He then reorganized his unit during an artillery barrage, so that he was able to repulse a counterattack and hold his gains. His outstanding display of courage and leadership reflect credit upon his character as an officer. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

First Lieutenant Conley G Cox, 01326894 (then second lieutenant), Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in the vicinity of * * * , Germany on 24 February 1945. Entered military service from Texas.

First Lieutenant Eugene A Duffy, 0439280, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Germany, Luxembourg and Belgium from 11 July 1944 to 17 February 1945. Entered military service from Illinois.

First Lieutenant Frank M Fulgham, 01307004, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near * * * , Belgium on 29 January 1945. After making a careful personal reconnaissance, Lieutenant Fulgham, commanding Company I, * * * Infantry, led his unit in an attack on the town of * * * across open terrain subjected to

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heavy concentrations of enemy fire. Due to his outstanding leadership ability, courage and tactical acumen, the objective was taken and counterattacks repulsed within a period of one and a half hours. Lieutenant Fulgham's performance reflects credit upon his character as an officer. Entered military service from Virginia.

First Lieutenant John V O'Brien, 01325925, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Germany, Luxembourg and Belgium from 14 to 19 July 1944 and from 25 July 1944 to 16 February 1945. Entered military service from New York.

First Lieutenant Graham I Stoneburner, 01303793, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near * * *, Belgium from 26 January to 1 February 1945. Entered military service from Virginia.

Master Sergeant Elmer L Shearer, 20722150, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Luxembourg, Belgium and Germany from 1 August 1944 to 24 February 1945. Entered military service from Nebraska.

First Sergeant Murrel W Lowry, 36077520, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Germany, Luxembourg and Belgium from 11 July 1944 to 21 February 1945. Entered military service from Illinois.

Technical Sergeant Orr T Nichol Jr, 37034126, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Germany, Luxembourg and Belgium from 11 July 1944 to 23 February 1945. Entered military service from Nebraska.

Staff Sergeant Charles C Dawes, 38127598, Coast Artillery Corps, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Belgium, Luxembourg, Holland and Germany from 19 June 1944 to 14 February 1945. Entered military service from Oklahoma.

Staff Sergeant Victor H Fraase, 37096382, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in * * *, Germany on 25 February 1945. Sergeant Fraase displayed outstanding leadership ability as he led a rocket-launcher squad in support of a rifle company engaged in attacking the enemy in the town of * * *. While moving from house to house in the town, Sergeant Fraase captured a German soldier who was firing an automatic weapon from a place of concealment. After the town had been cleared of the enemy, Sergeant Fraase established contact with other rocket-launcher teams and skillfully placed them in positions from which they could defend the town against counterattacks. His courage and resourcefulness under fire reflect credit upon his character and training as a soldier. Entered military service from North Dakota.

Staff Sergeant John W Hrnicek, 20722931 (then technician fourth grade), Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Luxembourg, Belgium and Germany from 1 August 1944 to 24 February 1945. Entered military service from Nebraska.

Staff Sergeant Willard H Merrick, 35469710, Coast Artillery Corps, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Belgium, Luxembourg, Holland and Germany from 19 June 1944 to 14 February 1945. Entered military service from Ohio.

Staff Sergeant James R Moore, 14004770, Infantry, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near * * *, Germany on 6 February 1945. Sergeant Moore headed a night combat patrol with the mission of obtaining enemy information and capturing prisoners, if possible. He led his men through numerous natural and artificial obstacles, reached the outskirts of the town of * * *, and killed an enemy sentry with his trench knife after the German had ambushed his group and sounded a general alarm for the garrison. Sergeant Moore then skillfully directed his men back to friendly lines without a casualty, although subjected to machine gun and

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mortar fire by a superior enemy force, and furnished his unit with vitally important information for ensuing operations. He proved himself an outstanding leader and a credit to the military service. Entered military service from Georgia.

Technician Fourth Grade Norbert N Hutchins, 36178377, Field Artillery, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near * * * , Germany on 12 and 13 February 1945. Sergeant Hutchins voluntarily left a place of cover to obtain information for shell reports during an intense concentration of enemy heavy artillery fire, with complete disregard for his personal safety. His efforts immeasurably aided in locating and neutralizing enemy artillery, and his courage, skill and initiative reflect credit upon his character as a soldier. Entered military service from Michigan.

Corporal William H Strunk, 20732805, Field Artillery, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Germany and Belgium from 25 July 1944 to 25 February 1945. Entered military service from Kansas.

Corporal John W Tilley, 34253776, Field Artillery, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near * * * , Germany on 12 and 13 February 1945. Corporal Tilley voluntarily left a place of cover to obtain information for shell reports during an intense concentration of enemy heavy artillery fire, with complete disregard for his personal safety. His efforts immeasurably aided in locating and neutralizing enemy artillery, and his courage, skill and initiative reflect credit upon his character as a soldier. Entered military service from North Carolina.

Private First Class Salvatore A Petito, 32795788 (then private), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near * * * , Germany on 23 February 1945. When enemy troops attempted to outflank and knock out his machine gun position with grenades during the course of a German counterattack, Private Petito, an assistant gunner, grabbed a rifle from a fallen comrade, ran to the left flank, and killed two German soldiers who were nearing his position. His heroic action saved his machine gun section from further casualties and averted a threat to the forward positions of his company. Entered military service from New York.

Private First Class Mark A Rooney, 32609509, Infantry, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Germany, Luxembourg and Belgium from 11 July 1944 to 25 February 1945. Entered military service from New Jersey.

Private First Class Henry Ruttenberg, 33938454 (then private), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States near * * * , Germany on 23 February 1945. Private Ruttenberg, an ammunition bearer, ran to the side of a wounded soldier who was lying in an exposed position subjected to enemy fire. Disregarding personal safety, he carried the wounded man to a nearby house where he skillfully applied first aid to a serious arterial wound. His immediate treatment saved the life of his wounded comrade, and reflects credit upon Private Ruttenberg's character and training as a soldier. Entered military service from Pennsylvania.

Private First Class Lonnie D Wainwright, 34684860, Field Artillery, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Belgium and Germany from 10 July 1944 to 25 February 1945. Entered military service from Georgia.

Private First Class Leon F Yeomans, 34684920, Field Artillery, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Belgium and Germany from 10 July 1944 to 25 February 1945. Entered military service from Georgia.

VI -- BRONZE STAR MEDAL (OAK-LEAF CLUSTER). Pursuant to authority contained in AR 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, in addition to the Bronze Star Medal previously awarded, a bronze Oak-Leaf Cluster is awarded to the following officer of this command:

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First Lieutenant Jim B Harper, 01169997, Field Artillery, United States Army, for meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in France, Belgium and Germany from 7 October 1944 to 7 February 1945. Entered military service from Tennessee.

VII -- PURPLE HEART. Pursuant to authority contained in AR 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, and Memorandum 34, Headquarters, Ninth United States Army, 8 September 1944, as amended, a Purple Heart is awarded to the following officers and enlisted men of this command for wounds received in action against the enemy on dates indicated:
