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I -- SILVER STAR. Pursuant to authority contained in AR 600-45, dated 22 September 1943, as amended, and Memorandum 21, Headquarters Fifteenth United States Army, 4 March 1945, a Silver Star is awarded to the following:

Technical Sergeant Samuel W McComb, 37070593 (then staff sergeant), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action near * * *, Germany on 21 April 1945. When Sergeant McComb, an acting platoon leader, learned that a large number of German troops with several tanks were deployed in a nearby woods, he quickly organized and led a volunteer patrol. Sergeant McComb maneuvered his men so skillfully that the enemy troops were unable to offer effective resistance. The patrol succeeded in capturing 47 Germans, 5 vehicles and numerous automatic weapons. By his aggressive leadership, Sergeant McComb relieved a serious threat to the security of his unit's area. His actions reflect high credit upon his character and training as a noncommissioned officer. Entered military service from Kansas.

Sergeant Arthur W Reynolds, 35042510 (then private first class), Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action near * * *, France on 8 November 1944. When members of his squad, advancing against the enemy, were pinned down by machine gun fire, and the squad leader became a casualty, Sergeant Reynolds assumed command, deployed his men, then went forward alone, killed one German and captured two others. By his intrepid actions, Sergeant Reynolds silenced the enemy emplacement and enabled his unit to continue to advance to its objective. His heroic actions are in accord with military tradition. Entered military service from Indiana.

Private First Class Ottis Strother, 38495911, Infantry, United States Army, for gallantry in action in the vicinity of * * *, Germany on 30 March 1945. When his squad was pinned down by cross-fire from enemy machine guns and an American tank was disabled and abandoned by its crew, Private Strother, a squad leader, disregarding personal safety, mounted the turret of the abandoned tank while the enemy hurled artillery, rocket and machine gun fire at him. Manning the .50 caliber machine gun, he neutralized two enemy machine guns, and covered the advance of his squad. Private Strother's indomitable courage, exemplary leadership and gallantry in action honor his character as a soldier. Entered military service from Louisiana.

Major Malcolm Kullmar, 0386335 (then captain), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in * * *, France on 27 September 1944. Overcoming fierce enemy resistance after a two-hour fire fight, Major Kullmar led his company to its objective, then personally supervised the construction of defensive positions

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while exposed to intense enemy fire. Upon learning that strong enemy forces with supporting armor were approaching on his left rear, Major Kullmar, exhibiting sound tactical judgment, superb leadership and indomitable courage, directed a withdrawal of his troops, under harassing small arms fire from enemy patrols, to positions where contact was re-established with friendly units and defenses were set up, making it possible to repel several fierce enemy counterattacks. Major Kullmar's heroic action reflects credit upon his character as an officer. Entered military service from Maryland.

Staff Sergeant Gilbert C Dial, 36634741 (then private first class), Infantry, United States Army, for heroic service in connection with military operations against an enemy of the United States in the vicinity of * * *, Belgium on 3 January 1945. Sergeant Dial, an ammunition handler, voluntarily assisted a forward observer in directing fire against enemy guns. When the forward observer became a casualty, Sergeant Dial heroically continued to direct fire against the enemy by crawling from the exposed observation post to the radio to transmit fire orders, then back to the observation post for further observation. When his radio was destroyed by mortar fire, he made his way to the rear then returned with another radio and continued his hazardous mission. His actions are in accord with military tradition.
